

MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

As I prepare this article I am watching the fall approach on the calendar with an increasing sense of panic. I just don't feel I'm ready for the fall. Yet here it comes looming up on me like a train locomotive which seems at first far away and then in an instant is upon you. I'm like a deer frozen in the headlights. And I'm starting to panic because I know that the busyness that has been held at bay over this short summer will overrun my life once again. There is so much to be done, and I'm not ready! Do you feel that way as well? I was mentioning this feeling to one of our ministry leaders and they said, "Didn't you write something about that once? Maybe you need to go back and read it." Sure enough I did! So here it is again, with my advice – do as I say, not as I do.

Be Calm – Carry On. That's a sentiment I saw on a T-Shirt. The T-shirt was being worn by someone in London who was being interviewed in a piece about the Summer Olympics. I don't know the saying's source or origin. For some reason that sentiment has stayed with me as I have been dealing with trying to prepare for vacation, preparing for what looks to be a very busy Fall in our church life, and dealing with family crises of varying intensity – in other words – the business of living. My first response upon seeing this sentiment emblazoned on the t- shirt was; "good – luck!" But upon further reflection I've decided it's a pretty good idea. In all things we need to try to "Be Calm and Carry On" – especially as we go about the work that Jesus sets before us – the work of the church, the work of discipleship.

When you think about it, there is an awful lot going on in the world that we could panic about. In fact there is an awful lot going on in our personal lives that we could panic about – and truth be told I often do. And this, I've discovered, is not a good idea because panic begets panic and pretty soon that's all I do. When I'm distracted with panic I find that I am not able to do very much that's very useful or productive – including dealing the whatever situation has caused the panic in the first place. Decisions that are panic driven are rarely good ones. Knee – jerk reactions are rarely the best reactions.

Come to think of it – Jesus never panicked! He was certainly busy; he certainly acted with deliberation and purpose, but he never panicked. The Gospel description of his ministry often describes periods of almost constant activity – but never panic. He was living the sentiment – "Be Calm and Carry On". And the source of his calm was his Father in Heaven.

One day Jesus told his disciples something that really started them panicking. He told them that he would soon be leaving them and going to his Father in Heaven. Suddenly they realized that they were going to be in the driver's seat – so to speak – and that the responsibility for ministry would be falling to them. I imagine that they started to panic just a little. But then Jesus assured them that he would not be leaving them as orphans; that he would not be leaving them without help or resources. Jesus promised that he would send them the Holy Spirit to guide them and help them in their ministry. So there was no need to panic – as long as they remembered the Holy Spirit was with them!

And that's the key for us as Christian disciples trying to stay calm and carry on in the face of often difficult and discouraging times. We have been given the Holy Spirit to guide us, to comfort us, to strengthen and shield us as we carry on in ministry. We just need to remember to stay connected to the spirit.

So here are some questions you need to ask yourself as panic sets in (and which it looks like I should be asking myself) – whether it be panic over a personal crises or over some difficulty we encounter in ministry. 1) Did you remember to pray? Or did you just leap in without praying? During Camp Hope we found that our work team was a lot more successful when we gathered in a circle in the client's living room and prayed. Believe me – we started to work the first day without prayer and it was pretty disastrous. 2) Are you allowing scripture to guide you? Are you engaged in bible study? Sometimes as we try to put our lives together we discard the instruction manual thinking we don't really need it. Then when the parts don't seem to fit we start to

panic. The Bible is our instruction manual – read it! 3) Are you worshipping regularly in the body of Christ? We need to remember we are not in this ministry thing alone – we are supposed to be doing it with others – so we need to support each other in prayer and worship. In other words - go to church! You will find yourself much better prepared to face those panic inducing situations.

As we get back into the routine of fall, and as we face the challenges of doing ministry in this swiftly changing world, there will be the inevitable panic inducing situations. But also remember that the church, the Body of Christ, continues on, and here you will find opportunities to worship, to pray, to study, and to be in fellowship. Here you will find the resources to - Be Calm and Carry On.

LETTER FROM SUN LAE KIM (dated July 4, 2019)

Dear Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. I thank and praise the Lord for your gracious and faithful partnership with me in sharing the Gospel with and making disciples of Mongolian people for the past 17 years.

I'm writing my last letter to all of you as a missionary in Mongolia with a grateful and heavy heart. It has been an amazing 17 years. I arrived in Mongolia with no personal gifts or talents, just a thankful and humble heart and desire to share the Lord's love and grace that I received and experienced. I knew no one in Ulaanbaatar, the capital of Mongolia and I was lonely. I had no choice but to totally depend on the Holy Father, the Son Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit. It felt good to be in Mongolia because I felt like I was in my hometown in Korea. Perhaps because Mongolians were like Koreans in their appearance and Koreans and Mongolians are ethnically related. Mongolia means "brave." Mongolia is also called "Blue Mongolia" due to the summer sky being so clear, blue and clean. I thought how good our life would be for the people here if their heart and mind were clear and clean just like their summer sky. The winter was so much different. I would call it "black gray sky". What a difference between the summer and winter here. I saw the same opposite spectrum with the Mongolian people, who are literally progressive and brave. The men are physically very strong perhaps because meat is the staple of their meals. At the same time, women are emotional and full of tears. The country is both open and closed due to Russian and Asian influence.

For the past two months, I had time to reflect on life and ministry here. My prayer, when I arrived, was that I could share the Good News of our Lord Jesus Christ with the Mongolians. When I shared the Gospel with them, it felt like I was "freeing" their folded wings one at a time so that they may one day fly like and Eagle to pursue the dreams and visions on their faith. When I shared the Gospel with young children, I felt like I was drawing the hearts of Jesus in their clean hearts and minds and with hope that they would be like a tree planted in a stream of water. Being here for 17 years allowed me to see the tree that I was hoping and praying for. These children became youth and young adults, who went abroad to work and study; some becoming GMF missionaries, pastors, ministers and church lay leaders. They were thankful and praised the Lord when they saw the Lord's words helping them grow in their faith and live a holy life.

In the past, they lived in a difficult situation with no hope, but now they have hope because they live lives of faith that please God. After they met the lord, the purpose of their lives began to change. Most satisfying for me were the moments of seeing them learn, praise, pray, evangelize, and serve. I'm so thankful to all my beloved children, young adults and believers who have worked together with me to save souls and lives in Mongolia.

As I leave Mongolia, I would be grateful for your prayers for me to become a person who is in the heart of God and will continue to fulfill the will of God. All praise and honor to our Lord Jesus Christ. May the peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you, your families and your ministries.
