An Encouraging Word

Last Sunday morning, as I was getting ready for worship and moving back and forth between my office and the sanctuary, I heard this tremendous racket coming from the trees behind the parking lot. Birds! An army of birds had taken up temporary residence and were making their presence known. Later that day as I sat on my back porch meditating and minding my smoker, I noticed clouds of birds circling and sweeping over the trees. It was a sure sign that my favorite season of the year is here — Autumn.

Hearing and watching the birds flock is a comforting thing for me. It is a sign of Fall and the ever constant, never-failing progression of seasons. The natural world continues to operate as God designed it. It is comforting to know that even with all the confusion we face in the world theses days that some things, like the change of seasons, remains constant. Constancy is something we all need especially in the chaotic world we face each day. Without constancy in our lives, the knowledge of things we can depend on – like the consistent change of seasons, life for many would be intolerable.

Many of you know I'm a sailor. I've been sailing boats since I was eight years old. One thing that I've learned is that it's no fun sailing when there is little or no wind. The best sailing comes when there is a stiff breeze. So, I've done a lot of sailing when I've had to shorten sail and simply hang on. I've also been known to break some rigging. The thing with sailing in a stiff breeze is that there is also a lot of wave action. Wind and waves go together. You can't have one without the other. So, another thing I've learned from sad experience is to limit my time below decks when the seas are getting heavy. This is because during these times I can't see the horizon or any stationary objects on land from the cabin. After a few minutes below in the cabin, even in moderate seas, I'll start to turn as green as a shamrock and inevitably endure the indignity of what comes next. I need the constancy of a never shifting horizon or object on land on which I can focus to prevent the vestibular chaos that is seasickness.

Likewise, we need constants in our lives if we are to endure the ever-shifting chaos that living in this world sometimes presents. We can find those constants in different places. We can find constancy in our families, and among loyal and constant friends. Some of us can find constancy in our work and in comforting habits. My brother and I find constancy in our yearly summer trips to the family cottage on Lake Ontario — a place where we have each spent joy-filled summers since we were born. We've managed to keep that place like a kind of time capsule with many of the same furnishings that were there when we were children. The world may change as time goes by but that place rarely does, and that brings us a measure of sanity. We all need that kind of constancy.

The greatest constant we have available to us is God. In Isaiah 40 the prophet Isaiah laments the inconstancy of worldly things. He cries out in verse 6, "All people are grass, and all their faithfulness is like the flowers of the field. The grass withers and the flowers fall, because the breath of the Lord blows upon them (a reference to the inconstancy of life itself)." But then he continues with the comforting reminder that God is the constant that we can depend on when all else fails. "The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of our God endures forever." He returns to this affirmation of God's constancy in verse 28, "Do you not know? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He will not grow tired or weary, and his understanding no one can fathom. He gives strength to the weary and increases power to the weak. Even youths will grow tired and weary, and

young men stumble and fall, but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They shall run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint."

The one constant we can depend upon, above anything else, is God. The key is keeping our attention fixed on God, depending on God as the constant in our lives. We do that by being consistent in our relationship with God. We do this by consistently attending to regular worship and daily prayer, in the regular and consistent study of scripture, and in service to God. In all this we keep God in our sight as a steady point of reference in an often-chaotic world.

Yes, I find comfort in the constancy of the cycle of seasons. The greatest comfort I have however is found as I daily encounter God, a constant companion in whatever seas I face – be they heavy or light. I pray that you may be able to do the same.
