Hello Everyone - As you may have noticed cold weather tends to be rough on hardware. Automobile batteries that are older and perhaps a little "iffy" give up the ghost. Plumbing weaknesses come out of the woodwork, literally. Evidence of neglected maintenance can be found everywhere. Winter is rough on people as well. Not only do we have to contend with the normal colds and flu, but we also have to deal with the Coronavirus as well. The cold makes our bones ache and our skin dry and itchy. All this means that we have to take extra care in this winter season.

Spiritually speaking we have winter seasons as well, times of stress and difficulty that take advantage of our lack of spiritual maintenance. These seasons will come and go but we all have them and for some of us it's a regular occurrence – as dependable as the turning of the seasons. Advent can be a time of spiritual maintenance, a time to attend to the maintenance of our spirits. Having done this, we can be ready for whatever spiritual winters come our way. Here's some information the Faith – Hope Circle would like shared.

Usually, we have a Christmas luncheon and invite the congregation, but since the prices are significantly higher and places are not open for lunch, we will not be able to do that.

At our December 2nd meeting, we will be collecting items for presents for the residents at the Glen Burnie Rehab Center. The items typically include hygiene products and crossword puzzles. We also sign and present Christmas cards. We will also be preparing gifts of cookies to shut-ins of the church.

In January, we will donate \$100 to the Child Development Center.

The Circle also works to provide a funeral luncheon for members, when needed.

Membership is open to all women of the church and monthly dues are \$10.00. We welcome all women into the Circle.

An important reminder to members and friends who enter the building – through either entrance – while the Child Development Center is open and operating: Please be sure you are masked – even if you are just going to the office or sanctuary. This is critically important for keeping our unvaccinated children safe and for setting a tone of caution for those using our facility.

An Encouraging Word

The word "icon" is most used today to mean a graphic representation on a computer screen or tablet which denotes a selection or command. There was a time, however, when the word was commonly used to describe something that was far more precious and meaningful. Icons were once, and continue to be, windows through which one can glimpse Heaven. Greek icons, for instance, focused on intangible things and spiritual values. Icons represented Christian teachings at a time when most of the population was illiterate and so was the principle means of Christian education. In some situations, it was thought that they put the viewer in direct contact with the Holy and so were transformative. Show me a picture on a computer screen that can do that!

During the seasons of Advent and Christmas we are surrounded by icons! We are surrounded by visual representations that put us in touch with holiness. For instance, I love to sit in my living room gazing at our Christmas tree decorated with colorful lights and ornaments. Many of those ornaments are icons in themselves each of which have special meaning to me. As I gaze at the tree with all the other lights in the room turned off I see, not just a Christmas Tree, but a representation of Revelation 21:2, "I saw the Holy City, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride beautifully dressed for her husband." There are times when I also see it as a visual representation of Augustine's "City of God".

If I shift my gaze slightly to the painting over our fireplace, I see another icon reminding me of the love of Jesus. The painting is entitled "Madonna and Child with Two Angels" by the fifteenth century Florentine painter Fra Filippo Lippi. In the painting the child is reaching out to comfort Mary, but also seems to be reaching out to comfort me as thought to tell me everything will be alright. As I look at that painting, I feel comforted. It is a representation of holiness that I find transformative.

On the mantle there is a collection of beautifully decorated angels. They remind me not only of the angelic announcements to Mary and to the shepherds, but also that I am surrounded by angels and messengers of God's love each day. The poinsettia on the stand next to the fireplace traditionally

represents the beauty of the Virgin Mary. In various other cultures it represents purity and immortality. For some the red bracts are reminders of the blood of Christ. To me it's a reminder of abundant and beautiful life miraculously present in the dead of Winter – a reminder to me of the abundant life found in Christ. Even the representations of Santa Claus we see everywhere in this season are icons of charity, good will, joy, beneficence, and love; all characteristics seen in Jesus.

During this season we surround ourselves with icons, representations, and reminders of God's grace. In fact, everywhere we look, if we bother to really look, we will find ourselves surrounded by icons — symbols that guide our thoughts toward God. Of course, they are very apparent this time of year in the symbols of Christmas with which we surround ourselves. I see them everywhere I look in every season of the year. Nature provides abundant examples; butterflies, flower petals, and rainbows to name a few of the more obvious. But they can also be found among the knickknacks scattered around our homes; children's handmade gifts that express love like nothing else can or some memento of an unforgettable day at the beach with loved ones long gone. We are all surrounded by icons and reminders of grace.

Now here is the most encouraging, and perhaps surprising, word I have for you today. You are an icon! You are a God formed image and reminder in the lives of others of God's love! At least that is what we are called to be. Each of us is God's gift to the world. Each of us is God's gift to life. God's love has been poured into us – to be poured out from us into the lives of everyone around us. We are each made in the image of God. Search for reminders of God's love in the faces that surround you each day. And may they see that same love reflected in yours.
