The earlier you sign on the easier it is for me to attend to the greeting responsibilities. It also gives us a chance to chat, and share prayer requests

## **An Encouraging Word**

"But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people." - Jeremiah 31: 33

It's fairly easy to lose sight of God amid all the confusion we experience these days. This is especially so if we don't have God's Word close at hand, written on our hearts in both

literally and figuratively. I have lost count of the times when I needed a comforting word from God and it sprang immediately to mind. There are three sets of verses that I don't need to run to the bible and look up. One is the Lord's Prayer, another is the Twenty-Third Psalm, and another is Matthew 6: 25 - 34 - the one that begins "Consider the lilies of the field, they neither toil or spin, yet Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these." It ends with the phrase, "Therefore be not anxious about tomorrow for tomorrow will take care of itself."

To be honest I don't have all of the verses down pat – after all there are so many versions of it I tend to get the different versions muddled – but I do know the beginning and the end, and the gist of what comes in between. But the words are there to remind me and to comfort me in those times when I feel like giving in or giving up to the powers of confusion and despair that can so easily overtake me. I'm always thankful for God's Word that simply didn't remain on the page but was written on my heart. I'm also grateful for the people who had a hand in writing it there; for the way they lived their lives demonstrating God's word in such a way that it stuck.

How does one write God's Law, or anything else for that matter, on a person's heart? It's a good question considering the state of people's hearts during times of upheaval and change; when the bedrock of everything they believe in is crumbling and their hearts are hardened by cynicism, doubt, skepticism, and suspicion. What has the power to penetrate a fearful or hardened heart? The only words powerful enough to get through shields of suspicion and doubt would be words that carry the power of authenticity demonstrated through sacrifice. In other words, the person who is declaring the word, is doing so by "walking the talk". The greatest example of this is seen in Jesus' life, ministry, death, and resurrection.

The prophecy of Jeremiah (quoted above) comes true in the life, ministry, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Jesus' act of sacrifice on the cross would emphasize and demonstrate the depth of God's love for God's people. On the cross the authenticity of God's love, lived out in Jesus, would be demonstrated beyond doubt and the image of God's son on the cross would sear God's law of love into cynical human hearts.

In the Gospel reading from John, Chapter 12, Jesus foresees his own death on the cross and portrays that sacrifice as the planting of a seed. Seed must be given up to the earth, sacrificed, in order that it may eventually bear fruit. In this case the seed is Jesus' life, given up that it may bear fruit in the changed hearts of God's people. This is the way. God writes His law of love on the hearts of people – they saw the authenticity of God's love demonstrated on the cross. Here's the really neat thing. People who have experienced God's love demonstrated in their lives through the authentic loving actions of others will themselves become instruments in God's hand helping to write the law of God's love in the hearts of others. For instance, the verses from Matthew I quoted above, especially the last phrase, were written in my heart by my mother who would often quote them to her worry-wart son (me) when I was busy imagining all sorts of future calamities. She also demonstrated these verses as she lived her life calmly and serenely even as she encountered the health problems that would eventually claim her life. So yes, she would often quote those words to me, but she lived them as well, and in so doing planted them in me. Yes, I can readily quote some of the words, but I really get their meaning, I understand their message, and rely upon that Word in my difficult moments, because they've been planted in my heart. Yes, I still worry, but not as much because those words about not worrying have become a part of me. I only hope that somehow I am able to plant words of assurance and comfort in the lives of others by living them out myself.

People these days hunger for authenticity. They also hunger for a holy Word of comfort and assurance as they face the uncertainty and anxiety generated by everything that's going on in the world right now. We are called to be instruments of God; scribes writing God's word of love, assurance, and comfort in the lives of others as we live lives grounded in God's law of love. The only way to plant that law of love in the lives of others is through living out that law of love in the presence of others. To the extent that we become God's scribes, living out our faith, committing God's word to our memories, our lives, and our actions, and planting those seed in others, we will find this world becoming a much brighter place.
