An Encouraging Word

"When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability." - Acts 2: 1-4

Happy Birthday Church! This Sunday we will be celebrating Pentecost, the day when the Holy Spirit was imparted to the church and the church empowered for ministry in the world. This time around our celebrations of Pentecost arrive in a world overwhelmed by fear, prejudices both ancient and new, division, violence, economic convulsions, a pandemic, and – lest we not forget – the increasing risks of war. None of this is new, but our connectedness makes all of this more noticeable in our daily lives. What is the meaning of Pentecost in the face of all this?

As I said, Pentecost is a birthday of sorts. Birthdays are the celebration of new life coming into the world and Pentecost is certainly that. The gift of the Holy Spirit brings the possibility of new and renewed life and hope. It is God's gift to us. As with all birthdays, gifts are usually involved. What are the gifts that we should bring to this celebration and to whom shall we present them?

If the disciples on that first Pentecost thought they would be able to return to Jerusalem, lay low for a while till the heat was off, and pick up as though nothing had happened, they would have been greatly disappointed. What happened in the upper room where the disciples waited could not be hidden. Evidence of the Holy Spirits presence tends to be pretty obvious. Contagious excitement and joy fill the air, barriers of misunderstand disappear, amazing and often miraculous events take place, and lives are transformed. From that moment of the Spirits arrival on the disciples carried the marks of the transforming power of the Holy Spirit. When one was in their presence there could be no doubt that one was in the presence of a member of the divine family.

You and I have received the same gift. We have received the Holy Spirit by virtue of our baptisms. We have been empowered to bring something precious into the world, the good news of salvation and hope. We've been empowered to bring healing to the wounds of the world we witness every day! What a wonderful gift to present to the world as we celebrate Pentecost! The world really needs that kind of gift. The question is - are we offering it?

Here's something we need to think about. When someone is in our presence do we leave no doubt in their minds that we are members of the divine family? Do our words and actions reflect the love, forgiveness, healing and hope of Jesus – the unique marks of membership in the divine family? If not, what will we do to change this? Does our living reveal the excitement, joy, and

hope that the Holy Spirit ignites? What are we doing to stay connected, or re-connect with the power of the holy Spirit in our lives so that our lives reflect the presence of the Spirit? What is it about you that identifies you as a member of the divine family?

If you're not sure about the answers to some of these questions I invite you to pray. May the Holy Spirit descend upon each of us in such a way that there can be no doubt in the minds of others that something wonderful has happened in our lives. May God grant us the boldness to live with the Holy Spirit not only inside us but exuding from every pore. May evidence of the transforming power of the Holy Spirit be seen in every facet of our lives. It's something the world really needs right now.
