An Encouraging Word

As a child one of my least favorite activities involved being chosen for teams. You know the drill. There are two "captains" and each takes turns choosing who will be on their team. I was not the biggest kid around, nor was I the strongest or the most coordinated. As a result, I was one of the last picked to be grudgingly accepted on my destined team. If I was the last picked, that was devastating. I was being judged as inferior. The whole process just reinforced my own feeling of inferiority and my dislike of those who stood in judgement over me. The whole process was divisive.

No one likes to be judged, but it seems we all do it. When we do, we are engaging in something that is destructive, not only for the ones we judge, but also of those who do the judging. Judging is rarely upwardly focused, it's more likely that when judging we are considering others as inferior to ourselves. In other words, we are looking down on someone. Either way it's destructive, whether we are congratulating ourselves in our superiority, or overcome with a sense of inferiority. Comparing ourselves to others is not a good way to build the unity and community that God intends. In fact, judging others is a divisive act that will destroy any sense of community. It is, in part, responsible for the fracturing of society we are experiencing these days.

Judging others is a mental process that is completely at odds with the values that Jesus lifts up in his Sermon on the Mount, especially humility, compassion, and unconditional love, to name several. So, Jesus warns us against doing it. "Do not judge others, so that God will not judge you in the same way you judge others, and He will apply to you the same rules you apply to others." (Matthew 7: 1-2)

Why do people sit in judgement over other people, or other groups of people? Most psychologists agree that judgmentalism arises out of feelings of inferiority or shame. So, people judge others as a

way of demeaning others in order to feel superior themselves. Judgmentalism may also arise out of not being privileged enough to receive unconditional love. Those who judge others may feel deprived of some asset and this sets them up to categorize others in a hierarchical or rank-order fashion. In other words, when they encounter another, it is always from a position of one being superior and the other inferior.

For those who live under God's reign such comparisons of inferiority or superiority are absurd. All are loved equally in God's unconditional love which has no limitations. Under God's reign each person is loved completely and absolutely by God. Those that would judge others are creating in their own hearts and minds differences that under God's reign do not exist. In so doing they introduce division where God seeks unity. In God's eyes not one of us is inferior to another. Such comparisons are not of God.

In fact, in taking the Judges seat over another person, or group of people, one is placing themselves in the God seat. They have become God's unto themselves, not a winning move in a monotheistic religion like Christianity. James 4: 11 – 12 declares, "Do not speak evil against one another, brothers and sisters. Whoever speaks evil against another or judges another, speaks evil against the law and judges the law; but if you judge the law, you are not a doer of the law but a judge. There is one lawgiver and judge, who is able to save and to destroy. So, who, then, are you to judge your neighbor?"

Of course, this brings up the question, who is my neighbor? A Pharisee asked that of Jesus one day. Jesus responded with the parable of the Good Samaritan. The parable teaches us that our neighbors are not restricted to those who live within our own homogenous society or culture. Rather our neighbors include everyone. We are to love everyone, irrespective of their race, culture, religion, or nation.

My encouraging word to you today is to avoid sitting in judgement over another, whether that other be another individual, people of another religion, people of another race, or people of another culture. All are loved equally by God, all are made in the image of God, all in one way or another reflect God's glory. Who are we to categorize anyone as inferior or superior when such categories do not exist under God's reign where the only one in a position to judge is God?

The temptation to judge others, it seems in some quarters, is being encouraged these days. The temptation to categorize human beings as inferior is very much alive and well. Yet to do so is a direct challenge to the authority of God, a rejection of God's unconditional love and grace, and stands in opposition to God's vision of unity and community in our world that reflects the all-encompassing unity of God's Kingdom. "Do not judge others lest thou be judged!"
