It is already time for Outreach to roll out projects for the holiday season. We are doing things a little differently this year. We do not need to prepare the Thanksgiving Fixing bags for our friends at the soup kitchen this year. Those items are being provided by the Food Bank. However, with the cost of groceries, more people are coming to the soup kitchen for help. The shelves are as empty as I've seen them. For the months of November and December our food collection will benefit the Pasadena Soup Kitchen with shelf-stable items that stretch a meal like pasta, mac & cheese, rice and instant mash potatoes. We are completely out of those items. The Child Development Center will be helping us with this project. Regular size items are needed, not the super-sized items found in the big-box stores. For Christmas we will be receiving names from the county for the Holiday Sharing program. We have requested the names of 5 small families and 5 seniors in our area. We will be asking members and friends to help by providing help with the cost of a Christmas meal and presents for the children. This is the program we have been helping for many years. An Encouraging Word

"Whoever conceals their sins does not prosper, but the one who confesses and renounces them finds mercy. Proverbs 28:13"

The questions at the end of the day are the ones that really matter. I'm talking about the questions concerning the day that is past, the ones that assail us when we go to bed, the ones that ricochet around in our minds as we replay the events of the day. Sure, there are questions about the future racing around as well but there are no settled answers for those. Those are about the future, what we plan to do and what we want to do. As we all know things don't always work out the way we want or the way we plan or even according to our predictions. There's nothing we can do about those questions other than to just keep wondering. It's the questions concerning the day that is past that are most important.

The important questions at the end of the day, about the day, are the ones that shape us and prepare us for the day to come. These are some of the ones I ask. What did I appreciate in the day? Did I thank God for it? Was there an act of kindness performed for another in my day? Did someone provide an act of kindness for me? Did I thank them? Did I positively impact someone's life? Or was I just a pain in the butt? Did I make a friend? Did I make an enemy? In the living of my day, did I make the day better for someone else? At the end of the day, I will have answers for these questions. I might not like the answers if I'm honest with myself, but I ask them anyway. I ask them because these questions shape me.

I used to hate tests. No matter how hard I studied I rarely got a perfect score. I especially hate math tests. I had a real struggle with algebra. I'd take the algebra exam and be happy if I got a75% score. The good thing about those tests is that they exposed my weaknesses and showed me where and how I could improve. When I used the old tests to study for future tests my scores improved. Answering those algebra questions, even the wrong answers, shaped my knowledge for future tests and prepared me for the final exam.

It's the same thing with the questions we ask ourselves at the end of the day about the way we lived in the day. Our answers shape our lives going forward. They guide the trajectory of our lives. If at the end of the day I realize that I have been unkind to someone I'll be resolved to try to be more kind in

the days to come. If I've hurt someone, I'll commit myself to apologizing in the day to come. These kinds of questions at the end of the day really matter, they shape our lives going forward.

James 5:16 commands, "Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective." Before we can confess to each other we need to confess to ourselves. That's why the questions at the end of the day are so important, they make possible the healing of our relationships and the healing of our spirits. Without them we may keep making the same mistakes over and over again. Confession is good for the soul and confession starts with confession to self. That's what the questions at the end of the day are all about.

These questions asked at the end of the day are important because they are preparing us for the final exam; the questions asked at the end of our lives, the questions that prepare us for eternity. As you may have guessed these questions at the end of life are strangely familiar. Have I been kind? Have I lived mercifully? Humbly? Is the world better because I lived? Did I say thank you? Don't be afraid of the questions. Don't be afraid of the answers. They are all for our good as we grow closer and closer to God.
