However, with the cost of groceries, more people are coming to the soup kitchen for help. The shelves are as empty as I've seen them. For the months of November and December our food collection will benefit the Pasadena Soup Kitchen with shelf-stable items that stretch a meal like pasta, mac & cheese, rice and instant mash potatoes. We are completely out of those items. The Child Development Center will be helping us with this project. Regular size items are needed, not the super-sized items found in the big-box stores. For Christmas we will be receiving names from the county for the Holiday Sharing program. We have requested the names of 5 small families and 5 seniors in our area. We will be asking members and friends to help by providing help with the cost of a Christmas meal and presents for the children. This is the program we have been helping for many years. An Encouraging Word

"Therefore, in order to keep me from becoming conceited, I was given a thorn in my flesh, a messenger of Satan, to torment me. Three times I pleaded with the Lord to take it away from me. But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." - 2 Corinthians 12: 7b – 9a

A watershed moment in my life occurred when, as a youth, I saw the musical "Godspell" performed on stage. It was during this performance that I realized that Christianity, and the Christian faith could be "cool". One song from that musical has continued to resonate with me, teasing me to explore my journey with Jesus amid various trials and tribulations that have tempted me away from the path altogether. The song is entitled "By Your Side". The character singing the song is asking if she can follow Jesus to wherever he is going. That journey however will be complicated due to a pebble in her shoe that she names "Dare". It's a pebble that she inserted herself and that she hopes one day to remove and cast away. Well, that's my interpretation of the song, there seem to be quite a few but this is the one I choose.

This song teases me with questions. Why would anyone put a pebble in their shoe? Why would she call the pebble dare? How can you journey with Jesus while in pain? Whether the song's composer intended to stimulate these questions I have no idea, but they are the questions that the song stirs in me.

So here is where those questions have taken me. At one time or another we will all carry painful burdens even as we attempt to follow Jesus, pebbles in our shoes. Paul refers to his own as a thorn in the flesh. It may be a burden imposed upon us, or it may be the result of our own bad choices or mistakes. It may be the burden of fear or anger. It may be emotional pain or incessant doubt. It may

consist of worries or concerns that overshadow everything else and take away our joy. It may be the burden of physical disease, personal loss, or worldly care. It could be any number of things. Whatever it is it's something that's not easily cast away, and it dares us to either continue with Jesus or abandon him. As we carry the burden, we are tempted each day to give in to the pain it causes. We are dared to either double down on our faith in Jesus and act accordingly or abandon that faith in spiritually destructive ways.

I've been carrying a tremendous pebble in my shoe for quite a while now. It is the burden of worry and concern over worldly matters. Some days it is overwhelming and drowns out everything else. Sometimes this burden provokes anger and fear that could take me to very dark places and thoughts. The temptation to follow those feelings and entertain that negativity is always there, but so is the invitation to step out in faith and trust in Jesus. The choice is always mine. I can respond to the "thorn in my flesh" with bitterness and anger which will lead me into ever darker places, or I can respond by doubling down on my faith in Christ, trusting in God's promise, "never will I leave or forsake you". (Hebrews 13:5, Deuteronomy 31:6) I choose to do the latter.

What is the pebble in your shoe? What is the thorn in your flesh? In what ways is it tempting you to live? Is it with continued faith in Christ or are you tempted to abandon that faith and take matters into your own hands. Consider the possibility that whatever the thorn or the pebble it may present a blessing in disguise– an invitation for you to allow Christ to share the burden. Is it possible that the pebble presents an opportunity to grow in faith as you trust Christ to help you bear it's weight and it's pain?
