An Encouraging Word

"God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only begotten Son into the world so that we might live through him." 1 John 4: 8b - 9

In my household one of our favorite things to do during the Christmas season is watch schmaltzy sappy Christmas movies. You know the ones, the Hallmark (now Netflix) variety. Yes, I know that's a shameful confession, but it's apparently one that many other people make as well since the number of these movies multiplies every year. If they weren't popular, that wouldn't happen. Yes, they are schmaltzy, predictably formulaic, emotional pablum, but we love them just the same. So, we grab the popcorn, a box of tissues, and indulge perhaps wishing somehow that the real world worked that way.

So, what's their secret? Why are they popular? If I were to hazard a guess, I would say that they are popular because in those movies love always wins. Always! Despite all the trials and tribulations faced over the course of the narrative love always wins in the end. It's a refreshing alternative to many of our real-world situations where things don't always end up so predictably wonderful. That's why we like them.

Something that we need to remember is that while these stories about a love that always wins are fantasies, the real Christmas story is not. We celebrate the very real event of love coming down at Christmas, a love that always will have the last word, a love that always wins. No matter what very real dramas overtake us in this life we have this wonderful Christmas assurance that love always wins. Always! Through whatever trials we face we will have a happy ending as long as we participate in the narrative. That is the promise of Christmas.

Despite the cynicism, distrust, fear, and anger that is so much a part of our world, love will always have the last word. Despite fearful events that threaten our existence, in the end love has the final word. This isn't a fantasy happy ending, it's a very real one. You and I are participants in this wonderful love story, not spectators. Unlike the actors in those stories we watch unfold in those Christmas movie fantasies, we have the power to invite others into the narrative so that love may have the last word in their world as well.

All movies have a tagline, a pithy statement that teases us to watch the movie. The tagline for our non-fiction narrative in which we all have a part? Love wins – Always! Rest in that promise in this holy season. Take to heart the words of the hymn, "Love Came Down at Christmas". "Love shall be our token; love be yours and mine. Love to God and neighbor, love for plea and gift and sign."
