An Encouraging Word from Pastor Mike

"As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience." - Colossians 3: 12

"It's times like these you learn to live again. It's times like these you give and give again. It's times like these you learn to love again. It's times like these time and time again."

These lyrics are the chorus to a song entitled "Times Like These" written and composed by Dave Grohl the front man for the Foo Fighters, one of my favorite bands. He wrote them in 2002 during a time of personal difficulty. Grohl is no stranger to personal difficulty. He was the drummer for the band Nirvana when that bands front man Curt Cobain, a close friend, committed suicide. Another close friend and Foo Fighters drummer Tyler Hawkins died unexpectedly last year while on tour. Dave Grohl knows pain and difficulty. I think the words of this song reflect a wisdom borne of struggle and difficulty which continues to cycle around in all of our lives "time and time again".

As I reflect on the lyrics, I consider what we all have had to endure over these last several years and what we may have yet to endure – difficult times. We've endured times of isolation and some of us continue in that isolation. We continue to endure a time of being polarized and driven apart by political and religious ideologies. We each must deal with personal tragedies and challenges. These times are a test of our bonds of fellowship, our compassion, and our ability to rise above the adversities and confusion that are so much a part of our modern world.

Whatever the struggles we face, through it all we have an invitation to rise above them as we follow Paul's advice first addressed to the Colossians, "As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience." We have a choice to make with each hurdle we face. We can use it as an opportunity to give of ourselves as we lessen the burden of others, or retreat into ourselves. We can use it as an opportunity to love others and embrace others to lift their pain or leave them abandoned to their pain. We are challenged in these times to live not only for ourselves but for others. These tests of love and compassion will arise again and again.

In times like these we are invited to grow into lives of compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. As we accept the challenge to continue loving others through it all, give of ourselves for the sake of others through it all, and live with compassion and patience through it all, we will be more like Jesus each day, and bring Christ's light into the dark and difficult times.
