An Encouraging Word from Pastor Mike

"Behold, how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity!" - Psalm 133: 1

There is an old joke I first heard in seminary years ago. It goes something like this. A wonderful Christian man died and found himself at the gates of heaven where he was greeted by St. Peter. St. Peter welcomed this sainted man with open arms and invited him on a tour of Heaven, his new home. St. Peter showed the man many wonderful sights. He saw the endless gardens where he was surrounded by absolute beauty. He strode past great halls where heavenly choirs were singing. He saw glorious columned structures where the Saints gathered, conversed, and prayed for those who remained below. At one point during his guided tour they came to an area bordered by a wall. As they walked along the wall, they passed a gate. St. Peter indicated that they needed to remain silent and not talk near the gate. Once they had moved on and St. Peter had indicated that it was alright to talk again, the man asked why they had to remain quiet near the gate. St. Peter responded, "Oh, the area through that gate, on the other side of the wall, is where we keep the (insert denomination name here), and they think they're the only ones up here. We just don't want to break their hearts by telling them they aren't." Yes, the joke is a poke at the exclusivity of certain religions and denominations. But it also points out the absurdity of a divided Heaven or Kingdom of God. God is not divided or segregated, neither is God's Kingdom.

God is creator and sustainer, the force which draws us together and binds us together in love. Scripture declares that God is love, and love is a binding force not a destructive one. The act of creation itself is an act of God's love binding all the elements of creation together. Ever since the fall recorded in Genesis God has been at work seeking to restore community as God intended it before sin entered and destroyed that unity. The ultimate act in this effort was the life, teaching, death, and resurrection of Jesus which destroyed everything that separated us from God.

That God seeks unity in God's creation is evident in much of Jesus teaching, especially that found in his Sermon on the Mount. Here we find lessons that encourage us to love one another, even those we deem to be enemies. Here we are encouraged to engage in actions that encourage the building of relationships rather than the destruction of them; forgiving, turning the other cheek, praying for those who persecute us, etc. In the gospel narratives we find that Jesus deliberately ignored barriers that divided community by associating with foreigners, sinners, and those considered unclean. In his ministry we first see the inclusiveness of God's Kingdom.

God's Kingdom, the kingdom toward which we all aspire, is the archetype and embodiment of community. There is no greater unity or higher form of community. That which divides, what we call sin, does not exist there. The imperfections of this world, marred by sin, divided against itself in countless ways, no longer exist. God is not divided nor is God's kingdom.

Yet even we who claim Christ as savior persist in our divisiveness, in our judging of each other, and in our disrespect of those who do not look, act, think, or believe like us. Some of us even emphasize and leverage these differences for personal gain; calling for further division. We'll never gain the kingdom this way. How can we seek a kingdom of complete community while living in ways here and now that divide community? It's absurd, just as the joke I began this essay with is absurd.

If the heart of our Lord is truly in us, if God's love truly moves through us and sustains us, we would seek the unity that God seeks. Inspired by the Holy Spirit we are called to bring healing rather than division. We are called to seek common ground rather than build walls. We are called to live toward the unity of the Kingdom rather than resist it. We are called to build bridges of understanding between people, not blow them up.

Those who seek separation or divorce from those they don't agree with, those who seek to divide and build walls, those who wall themselves off in enclaves of political, racial, cultural or religious purity, will be brutally disappointed with heaven I'm afraid. There will be no walled off enclaves there. We live in a time when division seems to be the easiest way to overcome our differences. It is occurring in our denomination, and now some extremists are suggesting a national divorce. But we need to remember the old adage that "united we stand, divided we fall". United we lift each other toward the unity of the Kingdom. Divided we enter into chaos in this life and the life to come. We anticipate and prepare for God's future Kingdom now by building community in this one. No better encouraging word can I leave you with today that this from 1st Corinthians 1:10, "I appeal to you, brothers, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you agree, and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same judgment."

That's all for today. I'll see you on Sunday either on Zoom or at in-person worship. Until then be well, stay safe, make good decisions in this Coronavirus environment, and in please stay connected to each other and to God.
