An Encouraging Word

The wolf will live with the lamb,

the leopard will lie down with the goat,

the calf and the lion and the yearling^[a] together;

and a little child will lead them.

- ⁷ The cow will feed with the bear, their young will lie down together, and the lion will eat straw like the ox.
- ⁸ The infant will play near the cobra's den, and the young child will put its hand into the viper's nest.
- ⁹ They will neither harm nor destroy on all my holy mountain,

for the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea.

This prophetic vision from the mouth of Isaiah, gives us a beautiful vision of the wonderful future that God intends for humankind. This is the future that God wants us to imagine. This is the future that God wants us to hope and aim for. The vision is allegorical. What is being described here is a kingdom completely in harmony. There is no divisiveness, rancor, bitterness, or deceit. The needs of each member of the community are met completely in God so there is no competition for resources. It is a world completely opposite this fractured one we live in. As such it is very hard for us to imagine, but we have seen glimpses of it through the life and ministry of Jesus.

It is the pursuit of this vision that Jesus encourages for his followers when he declares in Matthew 6:33, "But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." In simple terms I see the seeking of God's righteousness as living in a way that is congruent or in harmony with God's desire for humankind, the vision outlined above, not at cross purposes to it. That desire for humankind is an existence where we are in complete harmony with each other and with God; one where there are no longer any barriers between us.

In one sense this is a future hope and in another a present reality. This Kingdom we hope for and live toward exists out there in the future. Yet as we live the way Jesus teaches us, as we follow his commands, as we love others as he loves us, we experience the joy of that future kingdom in our present. As we live for Christ our lives become a kind of lens that focuses the light of this God intended future into our present.

We have a wonderful and amazing future to live for, the Kingdom of God of course, but also a wonderful future in this time as we live out the values of the Kingdom and transform our present world. What does living out the values of the Kingdom look like? It is living in ways that remind people of the Kingdom here and now. It's living in ways that focus Kingdom light into our present circumstances. We do that by engaging in ministries that bring hope, joy, and healing to our communities. We do this by being the hands and feet of Jesus who declared that he came to bring good news to the poor, to proclaim release to the captives, to bring recovery of sight to the blind, and to set free those who are oppressed. (Luke 4:18, Isaiah 61: 1)

As we do this, we draw closer to that day when" the lion will lie down with the lamb" and "the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the Lord". We don't have to give in to the despair that seems so much of our world. We don't have to shrug our shoulders and declare that there's nothing to be done about the state of the world. We are honored and privileged to be a part of Jesus' work in the world that will make our present dreams a reality and transform our world and our communities into something reflecting the joy of God's Kingdom, the Peaceable Kingdom of Isaiah 11.
