## **An Encouraging Word from Pastor Mike**

"And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven."

- Matthew 16: 18 - 19

I spent Friday morning, June 2<sup>nd</sup>, cleaning up the play area and basketball court at Furman L. Templeton Preparatory Academy in inner city Baltimore. Furman Academy is a Charter School for Grades 1 – 5 in a somewhat desolate area of Baltimore. Burned out and crumbling buildings are visible from the school property. Violence and the drug trade also occur nearby. Your lay member to Annual Conference, Jennifer Harris, spent the morning organizing teacher supplies closet at Westport Academy, another charter school. We were there because on that Friday morning members of the Baltimore Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church went out into the streets of Baltimore armed with rakes, brooms, trowels, mulch, trash bags, gloves, dustpans and the like to try to give the city a little hope and love; to be signs of God's Kingdom.

My group even included Bishop Easterling who spent the morning spreading mulch. We were greeted on the steps of the school by the administrator and assistant administrator who welcomed us and thanked us for bringing some light and joy into a somewhat dismal part of the city.

The children at Furman Academy were having a field day the next week and needed the play area and basketball court to be clean and safe. When we arrived, the outside basketball court and play area was covered with broken glass, trash, razor blades, and spent hypodermic needles and syringes. We were instructed to be careful with the sharps, use gloves, and deposit them in safe containers. So I carefully swept the dangerous items into the dustpan, and deposited them while saying a prayer for whoever the people were who had used those needles, who were struggling with addiction, who were looking for hope and needing some love. We all said lots of prayers that Friday morning.

All the time we could hear the children inside the gym laughing and playing and we knew that they would have a safe place to have their field day. Yes, it cost a little sweat, a little sunburn, and some stiffness at the end of the day, but we were the presence of the Kingdom in a place that needed reminding of the presence of the Kingdom.

The scripture sighted at the beginning of the Encouraging Word, affirms the church's relationship with the Kingdom of God. Being the presence of the Kingdom of God in those places and situations where the presence of the Kingdom is needed is what the church is all about. We knew that the people who really needed to see evidence of God's Kingdom would not make their way into the ballroom of the Baltimore Hilton where the business of the Conference was being conducted. If we

wanted to be God's presence in Baltimore, we would need to make our way to those places where hope and a reminder of God's love was needed.

As I was sweeping the detritus of human despair off that basketball court, I considered the ways that Mount Carmel UMC has provided, and is called to provide, signs of hope and reminders of God's Kingdom to not only the immediate community that surrounds us but to the wider world as well. To be sure, signs of despair and hopelessness are more apparent on the streets of Baltimore than they are in Pasadena, but that doesn't mean they don't exist. How are we being signs of God's Kingdom in our community? How are we engaged in being signs of hope and of God's love? There are opportunities for us to be the presence of God's Kingdom all around us, we just need to pay attention.

My encouragement to you today is to simply pay attention to the people and situations you encounter each day. Consider the ways that you can be a sign of hope and the presence of God's kingdom in that situation or for that person. My encouragement for us as a congregation is that we look for the opportunities that are all around us to be the presence of God's Kingdom in the wider community and to be in conversation as to how we might meet that challenge.
