An Encouraging Word from Pastor Mike

So, you've put in a long ten-hour day at work. It was a frustrating day where nothing seemed to work right. You're getting ready to clock out, you've put your equipment away, and you're looking forward to a few hours of sleep before you get up and have to do it all over again. As you're locking up a celebrity comes by and asks you to open up again and also give them a hand with a special project. What do you do? Most people would probably say "come back tomorrow". You're just tired, hungry, frustrated, and want to get some sleep.

That's the situation faced by Peter, the one that Jesus would call "the Rock", the guy that would end up denying Jesus three times (no one said you had to be perfect to be a disciple). Peter and his brother Andrew were fishermen. They had spent a fruitless night fishing and had returned empty handed. They had pulled the boat up on the shore and were mending their nets getting them ready for another night of fishing after they had eaten and rested. They were tired, hungry, frustrated, and ready to go home. Then this preacher they had heard about, and had briefly met, came by and asked them to grab their nets and put the boat back into the water so that he could preach to the crowds that were following him.

I'm sure Peter really didn't want to do that, yet he did, without comment or complaint. They rowed the boat back out so that it was drifting just offshore. The sun was getting high, it was getting hot,

and Peter was probably thinking about his wife and the meal she had waiting for him (that's right Peter was married). Finally, Jesus finishes preaching but instead of asking Peter to take him back to shore he asks him to toss his freshly mended, dried, and neatly folded net back into the water. This of course means that when he eventually gets back to shore, he's going to have to do the mending, drying, and folding of the thing all over again. Many people probably would at this point say enough is enough and just ignore Jesus and head back to shore. Not so Peter. Without comment or complaint, he does as Jesus asks and is rewarded with one of the largest hauls of fish he ever had. That's when Jesus tells him that he will make Peter a fisher of men.

Peter would go on to be the "Rock" upon which Jesus would build his church. He would be the most mentioned disciple in the gospels, the one whose office continues even now to be occupied by a succession of Popes. Just an ordinary fisherman, not that well educated, tired, frustrated, and hungry, and probably not all that excited about doing what Jesus asked but did it anyway. That decision took him to an amazing place.

Now a shift of scene. It's 2023 and like most people you're over committed one way or another. Like most of us you battle day in and day out with the frustrations of modern life. A member of the church's Leadership Development Committee (the nominations committee) contacts you and asks you to volunteer to serve in an important administrative or service role in the church. Most evenings, after a busy day, you know you are tired and ready for some rest and recuperation. Sitting in meetings is something you may have been doing all day, it's not your first choice of what you want to be doing on your evenings or during your time off. You may even think that you're being asked to engage in something that might be a waste of your time. Like Peter getting ready to row the boat back out into the water, there are things that you would rather be doing. So how will you respond?

Granted, I'm not Jesus, not even close, nor are any of the people on the Leadership Development Committee, but when we approach you, we are inviting you to do Jesus' work. It may not be glamorous or exciting, but it is important and we wouldn't ask if we didn't think you could do it. There will be frustrations, perhaps some inconvenience, and a bit of self-doubt; all forms of ministry include these things. The rewards may not be immediate though there will be fellowship and laughter along the way.

Peter was certainly inconvenienced. Yet Peter was the "rock" upon which Jesus built his church. He wasn't the only rock. The church is built of many "rocks", faithful people who like Peter, were and are willing to engage in Jesus' work even though they may be tired, busy, and over-extended. They may have other things that they would rather be doing. Yet, like Peter, they've picked up an oar and started rowing. And let's not forget that like he did with Peter, Jesus is taking us all on an amazing journey to an amazing place, and to get there we're all going to have to get into the boat and row. Along the way Jesus will show us how to fish for, help, and care for people. He will show us how to make a positive difference in this world.

So, either myself or a member of the Leadership Development Committee may be contacting you soon. Will you pick up the net, get in the boat, and start rowing? Or will you head home?
