An Encouraging Word



The next few Encouraging Words will focus on the themes presented by each of the Stained Glass windows in our Sanctuary and how they serve as comforting and encouraging reminders of what Jesus promises us even in the midst of difficulty.

The window I discuss this week is the one furthest back in the sanctuary. This window was given "In loving memory of Urma I. and William L. Cook by their children. In the center of the window are two intertwined Christian symbols, the cross and the crown. This emblem has been traditionally interpreted as symbolizing the reward in heaven (the crown) coming after the trials in this life (the cross). This symbol may have been inspired by James 1:12, "Blessed is the man who perseveres under trial, because when he has stood the test, he will receive the crown of life that God has promised to those who live in him." So, the cross and crown represents to some the promised reward of a faithful life. We are comforted by the promise that even though we will endure many trials heaven awaits us. To be frank, I'm not too sure about the theology of this, believing as I do in the unmerited grace of God. When I see the cross and crown symbol it reminds me that come what may Christ is my Lord (the crown) and Savior (the cross). I find this to be a helpful encouragement as I navigate through life. I serve on District Committee on Ministry which has the responsibility of guiding, mentoring, and evaluating candidates for ministry in the United Methodist Church as well as periodically checking in with and reviewing the ministry of Licensed Local Pastors and Certified Lay Ministers. We do a lot of interviewing and a question that we ask everyone that comes before us is, 'What does the statement "Jesus is Lord and Savior" mean to you?' It's not an easy question to wrestle with but in the wrestling, we are able to give some clarity to our relationship with Jesus. That's why we ask it. Every time I see the intertwined cross and crown I ask myself the same question, "What does it mean that Jesus is my Lord and my Savior?"

To say Jesus is my Lord is to say that Jesus is the one that sets the pattern and purpose for my life. Without pattern or purpose my life is a shapeless, amorphous existence. This state of being is wonderfully expressed throughout the hymn "Make Me A Captive Lord" and especially in the second verse.

My heart is weak and poor until its master find; it has no spring of actions sure, it varies with the wind. It cannot freely move till thou hast wrought its chain; enslave it with thy matchless love, and deathless it shall reign.

Obviously, the language here is from a time before modern watches or time pieces. The human heart is likened to a watch or clock which must be wound. (By the way, one of my pet peeves is how we moderns sing this verse often pronouncing the word "wind" as something that blows rather than "wind" as in something you do with a watch and which rhymes with "find".) Anyway, to say that Jesus is Lord to me means that Jesus is the one that sets my life in motion giving me meaning and purpose. He governs my life.

To say that Jesus is my Savior is a little harder to explain. The theology of salvation or soteriology in seminary was the subject which gave most seminarians, including this one, headaches. There are almost as many doctrines of salvation as there are denominations it seems. It gets really confusing. What I need to ask myself amid all this confusion is "what does describing Jesus as my savior mean to me?" Well, here it goes.

The best way I can illustrate this is my relating an experience I had when I was in college. Back then I did a bit of rock climbing as part of my ROTC training. I never did any free climbing, that is climbing without a safety line. I was always harnessed to a safety line which someone who was belaying always kept taught. If I were to fall, I wouldn't fall very far. The person belaying me would apply more tension

and keep me from falling. One day I did slip. I was about sixty feet up the side of a cliff when I lost my footing and down I went – only for about five feet. My fall was arrested by my friend on belay.

We are all climbing toward the Kingdom of God. Our entire life is spent in that climb and often we come to difficult sections of the climb that test us spiritually. There are parts of the cliff we call life that are especially dangerous, or hazardous, and frightening. Yet Jesus is on belay. Jesus will catch us when we start to fall. Jesus will apply tension to allow us to navigate the difficult parts. Without Jesus the climb would be impossible – we couldn't even begin. Yet as we trust in Jesus, knowing he is on belay, we have the confidence to continue on knowing that Jesus will save us should we start to fall. John Newton describes this well in his hymn Amazing Grace.

"Through many dangers, toils, and snares, I have already come; 'tis grace hath brought me safe thus far, and grace will lead me home."

The times we live in are difficult and frightening for many but when we allow Christ Jesus to set the pattern and purpose for our lives as our Lord and trust him as our Savior, we will find that we have everything we need to live our lives victoriously. We need to be reminded of this each day. So next time you enter our sanctuary, look to your left, take a moment to contemplate the Lord and Savior window, and know the Christ is with you as Lord and Savior every step of your way.
