An Encouraging Word



Though there is illiteracy even in developed nations, people in our modern world are, for the most part, literate. We are used to our ideas being expressed through our words, through our speech and in our writing. Yet in the early days of Christianity, especially before the advent of the printing press, ideas were conveyed to a largely illiterate world through the use of icons, pictures, and symbols. These icons and symbols served as a kind of shorthand for ideas that, if put into words, most people wouldn't be able to read. The stained-glass windows of the great cathedrals of Europe were

commissioned to tell the story of salvation, not through words, but through symbols and pictures that everyone, even the illiterate, could understand. Some of the symbols that were first used in those ancient windows endure in our present day and can even be found in the stained-glass windows of our own sanctuary where they continue to tell a story.

Today I want to focus on the second window from the rear of the sanctuary, the one next to the "Lord and Savior" window I discussed last week. This is the Susan Paige Chalk window given in memoriam by her family. Once again, we see two symbols that are combined. A butterfly is superimposed over a depiction of the Lily of the Valley.

The lily of the valley has traditionally symbolized hope and new beginnings. This flower is mentioned only once in scripture. It's found in the Song of Solomon (Song of Songs) 2:1. "I am a rose of Sharon, a lily of the valleys". Here it refers to the purity and beauty of "the beloved" to whom the poem is addressed. In the Christian era Jesus was at times referred to as "The Lily of the Valley". In this use it was a metaphor for the purity, beauty, and redeeming power of Jesus. The flower also came to symbolize the Virgin Mary. As it is used in our window it is an icon symbolizing Christ Jesus. The butterfly has long been a symbol of resurrection, rebirth, and transformation in many different cultures including Christianity. Superimposed over the Lily of the Valley as it is in our window it reminds us of the rebirth and transformation that we find in Jesus Christ. It reminds us also of the resurrection promised to all who look to Christ Jesus as their savior.

Living in our world is spiritually exhausting. It is easy to become overwhelmed by our world's spiritual brokenness. This window reminds us that spiritual renewal, transformation, and rebirth can be found in Christ Jesus. We will each face periods in our life, or situations that seem hopeless. We will encounter events that are crushing and discouraging from which we may even feel we will never recover. This window declares the source of our restoration, Christ Jesus.

As I read the inscription on the window, I realized that here was a gift presented to the church by a grieving family who had lost a beloved daughter. I have never been in that position, and I never want to be. The pain and hopelessness of that sort of grief I imagine to be almost unendurable. Yet in this window that family presented to the church a message of hope that sustained them even at the most desolate point in their lives. In the midst of despair, death, spiritual desolation, and what may seem complete hopelessness we can find renewal, rebirth, and resurrection in our Lord Jesus, the Lily of the Valley, as did the family who presented the window. Jesus has the power to transform grief into joy, despair into hope, and death into life. Now that message shines into our sanctuary with every morning's light.

In looking at that window I'm also reminded that this same message of hope and salvation is one that we should allow to shine through our lives into a world in despair. We are each called to be living windows through which the transforming light of Christ will shine, reminding everyone that our source of hope and renewal is Jesus.
