## **An Encouraging Word**



Peace. There's a lot of meaning packed into that word. In the Hebrew the word for peace is "shalom" and is associated with material well-being, good harvests, and safety from wild beasts and enemies. In the New Testament the Greek word for Peace, "Eirene", is defined as the absence of strife among individuals or nations. Peace occurs in association with righteousness, that is being in a right relationship with God and neighbor. Unfortunately for many these days such peace seems unattainable and is therefore desired greatly and at the top of our Christmas wish lists. We yearn for the arrival of "Peace on Earth and goodwill toward men." (Luke 2:14 NKJV)

I pray daily for peace. I pray for world peace. I pray for peace of heart, mind, and soul; the absence of care or worry over the state of the world and the state of my own spirit. I can't help but be greeted each day with reminders of our political, religious, and civil brokenness. I'm greeted each day with news of raging military conflict and ideological battles. Each day my prayer rises, "Lord, give us peace!"

Peace is the subject of the third window on the left as you enter our church sanctuary and approach the altar. I call it the Peace window and it was given in honor of the Rev. and Mrs. Walter R. Harris by Mr. and Mrs. Edward Lusby and Laura Mae Dodson. This window features a descending dove bearing an olive branch in its beak. Traditionally in the church this symbol represents the peace that is associated with baptism. We are reminded of the dove that descended on the occasion of Jesus Baptism.

"And when Jesus had been baptized, just as he came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to him and he saw God's Spirit descending like a dove and alighting on him. And a voice from the heavens said, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." Matthew 3: 16 – 17

Our association with Jesus through baptism is a relationship meant to be a source of peace for us. United as we are in Christ, we need not fear the chaos that often erupts into our lives and our world. Rather we take comfort that, come what may, our lives are in Christ's hands and that Jesus has made a way for us to a new kingdom unblemished by the brokenness of this world. Through baptism we are able to live in the life-giving light of that Kingdom even as we make our way through this one. But there is more to the message offered by this window. The descending dove is also a symbol of the gift of the Holy Spirit promised by Jesus.

"And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him because he abides with you, and he will be in you . . . But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid". John 14:16-17, 26 – 27.

Here I'm reminded that the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, is given to teach many things including the ways of peace. Our Lord calls us to be peacemakers and the Holy Spirit will, as we heed its promptings, lead us in the way of peacemaking. Jesus taught us a great deal about peacemaking. When we turn the other cheek, we are enabling peace. When we forgive others, we are making a way for peace. When we pray for our enemies and persecutors, we are enabling peace. When we live humbly, we make peace possible. In many ways throughout the Gospel our Lord models peacemaking in his relationships with others. We are given the Spirit to, among other things, guide us in the application of Jesus' teaching as we engage them in our modern situations.

This window reminds us then of two things as we pray for peace. First, that peace has already been made possible by virtue of our baptism. Not only are we made citizens of a Kingdom where peace reigns, we live in the light of that Kingdom here and now. Secondly, we are enabled to be agents of peace through the promptings of the Holy Spirit as we follow Jesus' teaching and example. This means that the peace we pray for is not something we expect to receive passively. Yes, true peace is a characteristic of the Kingdom we will enter when our sojourn in this one is complete. But peace is not a characteristic of this world we now inhabit. We are called to not only pray for peace but to be active participants in making peace. As we pray for peace we need also to actively work toward peace,

guided by the Spirit who brings peace. As we pray for peace, we need to ask ourselves "how am I an agent of peace, how can I be a peacemaker"?
