An Encouraging Word

(I'm taking a break from focusing on the stained glass windows in my encouraging word for a bit. Don't worry I'll be getting back to them.)

I've sometimes heard this season leading up to and including the twelve days of Christmas referred to as "the season of forgiveness". That's because forgiveness underlies everything about Christmas. Forgiveness is the basis for all of God's redeeming and restoring activity and Christmas, the birth of God's son into the world, is the center of that activity.

"For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him." John 3: 16 - 17

Not to condemn but to forgive, that is God's plan. And that plan began to unfold on the first Christmas and continues to unfold now and into the future.

Forgiveness is essential to God's healing of this world's brokenness. Throughout Advent we light the Advent candles which symbolize hope, love, joy, and peace. Yet without forgiveness hope is not possible, love is not possible, joy is not possible, and peace is not possible. Forgiveness opens the door to all these component attitudes of life whole and complete as God intended. We talk a lot in the church about God's unmerited grace. What we are talking about here is God's desire to forgive even the unforgivable. God loves us and forgives us even though we really don't deserve it and that forgiveness was enfleshed in Christ Jesus. As we prepare to celebrate Jesus' birth we really are in the season of forgiveness.

It is in this season of forgiveness that we need to try, as best we can, to practice forgiveness ourselves. For in so doing we open the door to healing in our own families and communities. This time of year can be really rough on families. Maybe it's because we are all forced to be indoors together. Maybe it's because when we gather together it's a lot harder to ignore differences, resentments, or irritations that fester under the surface and can be disregarded when apart. Whatever the cause it seems that family drama often takes center stage this time of year.

Perhaps it's especially important then, in this season of forgiveness when we celebrate God's forgiving act in Jesus, that we need to practice some forgiveness ourselves. As we practice forgiveness, we will ourselves become agents of hope, love, joy, and peace in our own little corners of the world. We will be not just observing God's act of forgiveness and redemption, we will be participating in it.
