Encouraging Word from Pastor Mike

The other day I noticed a wonderful reminder of the coming Spring and the renewal of life. It was right up next to the eastern facing wall of our house in the Catoctin Mountains. A beautiful purple Hyacinth was blooming. In the first week of March! Everything else around it still looked dead. The grass is still brown, and the trees are still bare, and the ground where it was growing had just been liberated a few weeks previously from the encroachment of brush and weeds that had left their marks. I didn't even know Hyacinth bulbs had been planted there. Yet there it was; hope and life in the midst of desolation.

I have several favorite flowers and the Hyacinth is one of them. The purple Hyacinth flower symbolizes spiritual growth, renewal, sacrifice, and rebirth while the white flower symbolizes purity and innocence. Given this symbolic nature of the flower it has long been associated with Lent and Easter. Part of the reason for this can probably be attributed to the Greeks. A legend that early Christians were probably familiar with was the Greek legend of Apollo and Hyacinthus. According to this legend Hyacinthus was a Greek youth who, because of his great beauty, was beloved by the god Apollo. One day Apollo was teaching Hyacinthus to throw the discus. As he demonstrated he threw a discus which accidently hit Hyacinthus on the head and killed him. Hyacinthus' blood spilled on the ground and from that blood sprang the Hyacinth, a rebirth of the beauty of Hyacinthus. Early

Christians drew obvious parallels of this legend with the spilling of Christ's innocent blood on the ground, shed for human sin, and the resurrection that followed.

As we consider the purple hyacinth we are reminded of the spiritual growth and renewal we are to be engaged in through the season of Lent and beyond; a path that leads through sacrifice to resurrection. As we consider the white hyacinth, we are reminded of Jesus' purity and innocence and wonder, in the words of the hymn, "what wondrous love is this that caused the Lord of bliss to bear the dreadful curse for my soul".

As we have journeyed through the season of Lent and approach the celebration of Easter, we have been doing so in what seems the lifelessness of Winter; not just a seasonal winter but a spiritual one as well. All around us we see reminders of spiritual desolation in the growing polarization and incivility of our own nation, the human tragedy of Gaza, the unrest and violence in Haiti, and a protracted war in Ukraine just to mention a few. Yet in the middle of this we have Easter springing up, like that Hyacinth next to my house – surrounded by the desolation and ravages of Winter, reminding us of new life, renewal, hope and resurrection. May this coming celebration of Easter be for you a blooming of hope, joy, renewal, and hope of resurrection in the midst of whatever Winter you face.

My encouragement to you this week is to continue along the Lenten path of reflection, renewal and spiritual growth as we accompany Jesus along the path that leads through the cross to rebirth and resurrection. Come join us as we celebrate Palm Sunday this Sunday and remember Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. Then join us next Thursday as we commemorate Jesus' last supper with his disciples and the beginning of his Passion. Return then to worship with us on Friday as we observe Jesus' passion. Then on Easter Sunday join in our celebration of resurrection and everlasting life. I hope to see all of you there.

That's all for today. Be well, be forgiving and gracious. Be safe, stay connected, and I'll see you in church or on Zoom this Sunday.
