## **Encouraging Word from Pastor Mike**

This encouraging word is more informational than encouraging. It's more like a Confirmation Class lesson but some of you may find it interesting.

As you are reading this Donna Delawder, and I are attending the 240<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. For those unfamiliar with the organization of the United Methodist Church, an Annual Conference is a regional grouping of United Methodist Churches which meets annually under the supervision of a bishop for the purpose of organizing and administering ministry. Our Annual Conference includes congregations within the state of Maryland (west of Chesapeake Bay) Washington D.C., the eastern panhandle of West Virginia, and Bermuda. Our Bishop is Latrelle Easterling who also serves as the bishop of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference. Each congregation is represented by one or several lay delegates depending upon congregation size and average worship attendance. The number of lay delegates is balanced by the number of ordained clergy who are members of the conference. Ordained clergy do not hold membership in any local church but are members of the conference. Our Annual Conference offices are located in Fulton, Maryland.

Currently the Baltimore-Washington Conference is further organized into eight regional districts which are: The Annapolis District, The Baltimore Suburban District, The Baltimore Metropolitan

District, The Washington East District, The Central Maryland District, The Greater Washington District, The Frederick District, and The Cumberland-Hagerstown District. Each District is supervised by a District Superintendent. Together the Bishop and the District Superintendents make up the Cabinet which, among other things, is responsible for the assignment and appointment of clergy to congregations. Our District Superintendent is the Rev. Sarah Schlieckert. This configuration of districts will most likely be changed by vote of the lay and clergy members of this year's conference so stay tuned.

Our Annual Conference has the distinction of being the oldest Annual Conference in Methodism and first met at the Christmas Conference in 1784 at Lovely Lane Chapel in Baltimore, Maryland. At that conference two Bishops were elected to supervise the newly formed Methodist Episcopal Church in America. These were Bishop Thomas Coke, and Bishop Francis Asbury. This year's meeting, the 240<sup>th</sup>, is taking place at the Baltimore Hilton Hotel and Conference Center which is adjacent to Camden Yards. In fact, Bishop Easterling will be throwing the first pitch at the Orioles game tonight (May 29<sup>th</sup>). Here are some highlights of what we will be doing at this annual conference. We will be voting to restructure the organization of the conference. If the vote carries, local churches will be organized into hubs of 8 to 12 churches. These hubs will be organized into six non-geographical districts based on population density. These in turn will be organized into two administrative regions. We will be voting on an Annual Conference budget. We will be voting to close four United Methodist Churches where ministry is no longer viable. We will be voting on matters concerning financial responsibility to retired clergy and spouses. We will be voting to increase or continue at present levels the equitable salary base compensation for clergy. The Council on Finance and Administration is recommending lowering the amounts local churches pay in apportionments – we will be voting on that recommendation. We will be hearing reports from various committees and councils. We will be commissioning 10 Deacons, Provisional Deacons, and Provisional Elders and we will ordain 13 Elders. We will recognize the retirement of 33 Elders. There will be a memorial service for all those former lay delegates and ordained clergy who have passed away in the preceding year. There are four resolutions that we will be voting on which, if approved, serve as guidance for local congregations as they do ministry. There will of course be times of worship and prayer intermixed with all of this. We will hear from several speakers. For early risers and attenders there will be bible studies each morning at 8 a.m. We will be sending nominations to the Jurisdictional Conference of Clergy members for possible election as a Bishop. (This is provisional since the General Conference decreased the number of bishops serving in the North-East Jurisdiction by two bishops – so the election of a new bishop may not take place.) Finally, the list of pastoral appointments will be read. These pastoral appointments will be effective on July 1, 2024.

As you can see there is quite a bit to be packed into three days. What is encouraging here is that the business and the ministry of the Annual Conference and the local churches continue even in the midst of controversy and change. In the ordination and commissioning of new Clergy, diaconal ministers, and Provisional Elders we celebrate God's calling upon these men and women and recognize that God's call never fades, it meets the needs of each new generation. We've been at this for 240 years now and each time grace, love, wisdom, the moving of the Holy Spirit have prevailed. May it do so for at least another 240 years. Please keep all of the lay delegates, ordained clergy, district superintendents, and our bishop in your prayers as we do this important work. That's all for today. Be well, be forgiving and gracious. Be safe, stay connected, and I'll see you in church or on Zoom this Sunday.
