2024 Advent Study

STARTS TONIGHT!!!! Please Join Pastor Mike on Zoom for our 2024 Advent Study - This year we will be guided through our study using the book "An Unlikely Advent" written by Rachel Billups. This four-week Advent study focuses on the experiences of four sets of often overlooked characters in the Nativity story. During this Advent season, Rachel Billups guides readers through the themes of hope, love, joy, and peace by sharing the stories of Elizabeth and Zechariah, Herod, the Magi, and the shepherds. Each set of unexpected characters has something to teach about living faithfully on the journey to Christmas. As with our other bible studies this one is accompanied by a video with a segment assigned to view at your leisure as you prepare each class. The video is available through the church's Amplify. Media account. Some of you have used this before. For those of you who have not, information about accessing the videos will be sent when you register for the bible study. The book – An Unlikely Advent – is available through Amazon and Cokesbury. It is also available on Kindle. For those who wish to dig deeper there is a workbook available that goes with the study. An Encouraging Word from Pastor Mike

A poor carpenter, a betrothed yet unwed mother, and shepherds abiding in the fields. These were the first to know about and witness the birth of hope into a world where hopelessness reigned. Jesus, the bringer of hope was born into a world of poverty, into a nation toiling under the tyrannical rule of a vassal king, who was himself a puppet of Caesar Augustus. It was a world of corruption and harsh intolerance. A hopeless world. The child born in Bethlehem, witnessed by shepherds and heralded by angels would bring hope to the hopeless, healing to the afflicted, and the joy of salvation to a world

immersed in sin. The hope that was born into the world two-thousand and twenty-four years ago is still in force. The good news and joy of that birth is just as fresh today as it was on the day of Jesus' birth – as long as you and I make room for Jesus in our hearts.

That's something I think we tend to forget. I know that I have – especially during these last few weeks. Over the last several weeks I've been overcome with a feeling of joylessness and hopelessness; powerless in the face of a tide that has turned and is sweeping my relatively kind and safe world away. These feelings are fueled by a fear that we may have put anger, vengeance, intolerance, pettiness, and prejudice in the driver's seat and must now await the inevitable crash.

Then the other day as I was brooding over these dark thoughts something happened to redirect my contemplations. I was on one of my tedious drives up to northern Frederick County. I had managed to find a radio station that was already playing Christmas music, and I heard the familiar and comforting notes of "Joy to the World." "Joy to the world, the Lord is come!" It suddenly hit me like a ton of bricks that we are about to enter the season of hope when we prepare to celebrate the day that hope and joy was born into a hopeless and joyless world. Jesus was born into our world not just to overwhelm the darkness of first century Israel and Palestine. Jesus was born into the world to overwhelm the darkness of every century – including the one we are now living in. Jesus was born to overwhelm our anger, our desires for vengeance, our intolerance and pettiness, and our fears with love. I realized that by dwelling on my fears I was allowing that darkness to overwhelm me. Rather I need to dwell on the good news of love's incarnation into the world and allow that incarnation into my heart.

The hymn continues, "Let earth receive her King; let every heart prepare him room". Hearing these familiar words sung once again I was reminded that I can either allow my heart to be occupied by things like fear and worry over temporal events over which I have little control, or I can allow the joy of the Lord to overwhelm my heart filling it a hope that no earthly power can diminish. As I hear the hymn using the sovereign language of, "Lord" and "King", I have to ask myself – who or what am I allowing to be Lord and sovereign over my life; that which is temporal or that which is eternal? I realize now that it is within my power to evict all the fears and negativity that I've been feeling over the last several weeks from my heart and invite the Lord of Love, born in Bethlehem, to occupy it. Perhaps the reason I'm feeling so down is that somehow through the turmoil of worldly cares arising over the economy, an endlessly divisive electoral process, and the rise of incivility, I've somehow evicted the wrong tenant from my heart. In this season of Advent I'm reminded that as I make room for Christ Jesus in my heart as Lord and sovereign, Christ's presence will drive the negative things out.

If you are like me and approaching this holy season with bitterness or fear that is overwhelming you consider the possibility of following the advice of the hymn "Joy to the World". Make room in your heart for Jesus to occupy it as Lord and sovereign of your life. Invite Christ into your heart every day, all year long, and I am sure your days will be filled with hope and joy that will outshine anything worldly striving has to offer.

That's all for this week. Continue to care for each other with love and holy affection. I look forward to seeing you Sunday, or at least knowing of your presence on Zoom. Until then – Blessings & Peace - Pastor Mike.
