Volunteer Opportunity

St. Andrews Episcopal Church hosts Winter Relief annually and this year it will be the week of February 17 to February 24. This is a brief description of the program as mentioned on their website - <u>https://www.arundelhoh.org/winter-relief/</u> "The Winter Relief Program provides emergency shelter to men and women who are homeless during the winter months. In partnership with over 40 houses of worship, the program provides shelter, food, and social and spiritual support during the coldest months of the year. The program runs approximately 26 weeks each winter. Hosted at different Anne Arundel County Houses of Worship each week from late October through March, the shelter is a safe and comfortable refuge. Host sites provide guest services, meals, companionship, activities, and spiritual guidance during their designated week."

They need volunteers for chaperoning the guests. They have different time slots available: 4:30 p.m. to 10 p.m., 10 p.m. to 2 a.m., 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. This is an excellent opportunity for anyone who works day shifts and would be interested in a volunteer opportunity during the evening. It involves sitting with and monitoring our guests. They would love to discuss all the details and possibly other volunteer opportunities with this ministry. An Encouraging Word from Pastor Mike

"Finally, be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. Put on the full armor of God so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes." Ephesians 6: 10 – 11

There is a wonderful old hymn in our Hymnbook that is often overlooked but I believe is appropriate for these times. The Hymn is "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus". It was written by George Duffield in the mid nineteenth century. The tune was composed by George Webb at about the same time. It appears in our Hymnbook as number 514 and was inspired by Ephesians 6:10 – 17 in which Paul is encouraging us to put on the whole armor of God.

At first glance this Hymn is very militaristic, "Stand up, stand up for Jesus, ye soldiers of the cross; lift high his royal banner, it must not suffer loss." It sounds like a battle hymn, and it is, just not in a physical sense. The "mighty conflict" that is mentioned is a spiritual one. The un-numbered foes are the temptations we face as we encounter trials and difficulty; temptations to live, act, and speak in ways that are not Christian. I would include here the temptation to give in to despair and hopelessness, or the worst temptation of all, to give up on Jesus or the promises of God- to abandon the faith. These are temptations that can lead to spiritual destruction.

The hymn encourages us to put on the armor of God and employ it in the spiritual battles we face. Paul's letter to the Ephesians, on which the hymn is based, is one of encouragement. There are no specific problems that the Ephesian church was facing other than the one faced by all Christian congregations meeting in areas of Roman occupation, persecution. At times the persecution could be severe. Paul knew that any Christian facing persecution could easily give in to anger, hopelessness, despair and a host of other emotions that could lead to abandoning the faith and spiritual death. Therefore, he encourages us to put on the Whole Armor of God. That armor consisted of the belt of truth, the breastplate of righteousness, the gospel of peace, the shield of faith, the helmet of salvation, the sword of the Spirit, and prayer. As I read it Paul encourages us to be truthful in all our dealings and relationships and counter lies that we might be tempted to spread. We are encouraged to live in a right relationship with God by conforming our lives to the standards set by Christ Jesus in his life and ministry. This would include loving all others, forgiveness, living humbly, praying for all others including those we might consider enemies. It means always seeking peaceful and equitable solutions to our disputes. The sword of the Spirit is the Word of God. Knowledge of scripture is a handy weapon to have in our possession in all our spiritual battels. Prayer is our way of staying connected to God through the fog of our spiritual battles.

Now I left one weapon out and that is the shield of faith. How do we keep the faith through difficult times like the ones many are facing these days? We do so through the mutual support of a loving and caring spiritual community. In the hymn I referenced above we find this line, "Ye that are brave serve him against unnumbered foes; let courage rise with danger, and strength to strength oppose." Strength to strength oppose is a curious phrase but in the context of the rest of the hymn and in the old-fashioned language of the 18th century it means to stand together against the spiritual temptations that difficult times bring. A modern translation might sing "and hand in hand oppose". Spiritual battles are best faced when faced together. We are called to be a part of a community of faith where we support each other in our struggles. In this community we are called to encourage the faith of others and others encourage our own faith.

As we face uncertain times, and their accompanying spiritual struggles, the church is an indispensable resource. Through corporate worship and prayer, through its preaching and teaching, and through fellowship we are equipped to counter hopelessness with God's assurance and despair with the joy knowing Christ's presence with us experienced in this community we call the church.

That's all for today. I'll see you on Sunday, or on Zoom, weather permitting. Until then be safe, stay strong, and encourage each other. Blessings & Peace, Pastor Mike
