#### An Encouraging Word from Pastor Mike

I came across this little gem that I wrote in April 1997 – I think it still applies to our living right now.

The world was not a friendly or safe place for Jesus' disciples following the crucifixion. At best the world was indifferent. It was indifferent to the fear and pain the disciples were experiencing because of Jesus' crucifixion. Even following Jesus' resurrection, the disciples understood that the world was a dangerous place. Jesus' resurrection did not protect them from the physical discomforts and dangers the disciples expected to face. They were still subject to the uncertainty of a frightening, violent, and dangerous world. The events of the cross did not protect Stephen from being stoned to death. Nor did it protect Peter from his crucifixion on an upside down cross. Jesus' death and resurrection did not change the fact that the world was an indifferent and dangerous place. But, it did and does proclaim a God who is not indifferent to human pain and suffering.

Jesus made a promise to the disciples who had to exist in this world and serve in his name. "I will not leave you desolate; I will come to you. Yet a little while, and the world will see me no more, but you will see me; because I live you will live also." (John 14: 18 - 19) This is a promise that no matter how

bleak the world may seem at times, Christ will be with us – comforting us, strengthening us, encouraging us, and assuring us.

We are shaken countless times by many of the things we see taking place in our world. We are reminded time and time again that the world is not necessarily a friendly or safe place. Yet Christ is with us. "And I will pray the Father, and he will give you another counselor, to be with you forever, even the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, for he dwells with you, and will be in you." (John 14: 16 - 17) It is the risen Christ in us, with us, and working through us that will make the world a friendlier place and much less indifferent to human pain and suffering. We may not be able to stop the craziness or end the danger, but the Spirit of Christ will always help us overcome and get on with living in an uncertain world.
